hen Rachna Patel and her husband, David, bought their Los Angeles home about two years ago, they embarked on a complete reno with Eric Olsen, their friend and architect. Starting with the kitchen, they brought all of the rooms in the 1954 house up to date. "We loved how it turned out," says Rachna, "but with black and gray floors, reclaimed wood, and metal fixtures, it felt dark and masculine. We needed help bringing in the prettiness." What Rachna had in mind, she realized, was exactly the sort of cheery style she'd seen on Emily Henderson's show, Secrets From a Stylist. So she shot the star an email asking if Emily was game for the job. Her reply: Yes!

Emily: When I first walked through the house with Rachna, I totally understood what she wanted. The industrial elements looked awesome, but the house seemed very "dude."

Rachna: Getting some color in was definitely one goal, but since we have a kid, I also told Emily I didn't want to be constantly worried about Eli getting hurt or breaking things.

Emily: We talked about that a lot. It's one reason I chose the round brass coffee table. Brass is pretty much indestructible, so it's incredibly kid-friendly.

The key to a great gallery wall is varying frame sizes. "Add one or two really big frames—like 16 inches by 20 inches—and an art wall immediately looks highend," says Emily. Then mix up the other sizes, and hang some horizontally, some vertically.



To make this room warm and inviting—a place to relax after a busy day-Emily picked an assortment of pieces with rounded edges. The pouf is from Garnet Hill, and the coffee table was a flea market find. Ditto the teal armchairs, which were a steal at \$450 for the already upholstered pair. The color scheme—a mix of blues with a few pops of yellow—is repeated all around the house. "I thought we'd be adding red to warm up the gray and black, but Emily knew better!" says Rachna.









Why not use it in a playroom?





"With so many little cubbies, this could have become the priciest unit to style ever," says Emily. "I came up with the idea to use mason jars because they're inexpensive. We painted the insides by swirling around two coats of regular house paint. I was going crazy trying to pick five blues, then I thought, Why not just take five colors from the same paint strip?"

David: One of the pieces Rachna and I found on our own is an old hotel mail cabinet [above]. I imagined using it to store glasses in a bar area, but Rachna and Emily had a different idea. **Rachna:** We put it in the playroom, and I told Emily: "Fill this cheaply!"

Emily: They also had the blue chest. Rachna found it at a shop in Los Angeles, and it has names of Indian spices written on it, which we loved. At one point it was in the master bedroom, but it made perfect sense in the playroom filled with crayons and coloring books. The striped rug is from Dwell Studio. I picked it to keep the blue and yellow theme going.

Rachna: One thing I love about this room is you don't know if it's for a boy or a girl. We may have another child one day, and if we have a girl, we can keep everything exactly as it is.

David: Rachna and I decided on the chalkboard wall before Emily got started. We liked the idea, but it looked like a big black hole.

Emily: On such a huge expanse, chalkboard paint can look monolithic. That's why we needed all the brights.

They already had the breakfast nook, and even the cushions. I love a good old-fashioned stripe, but it is conservative, so I added a mix of pillows, in different shades of blue, to help make it more fun. The shades are cordless, so you just push them up or pull them down.

David: At one point we considered getting rid of the nook entirely in favor of more counter space and

cabinets, but it's become the center of the house. **Rachna:** We use it for breakfast and snacks, and when Eli's friends come over, they always gravitate there. The drawers underneath are incredibly helpful. That's where we store the stuff we registered for before our wedding and never use!

Emily: The pendants in the room were in place before I started working on the house, and they're pretty great. Same with the pull-down faucet. I focused attention on accessories, like the big round cutting board that brings some warmth to the space.


